SALA Festival is the world's largest open access visual arts festival and a jewel in South Australia's crown. It is a truly inclusive festival, embracing the essence of community and celebrating amateur and professional visual arts creatives at all stages of their practice. SALA imposes no restrictions as to what can be called a gallery in the month of August each year. It issues an invitation to get involved and be brave.

This year 11,612 artists created and exhibited work for 717 exhibitions across the entire state of SA. The 2025 South Australian Living Artists (SALA) Festival saw audiences exceed 1,000,000.

South Australia offers a unique creative environment, which has resulted in the state being home to an exceptional community of artists. Artists thrive in South Australia. SALA Festival was founded to celebrate this, and to draw attention to the exceptional artists who live and create in the state of South Australia, and its unique visual arts ecology.

As an open access festival, SALA understands the importance of cultivating not only artists but audiences. Audiences are integral to the visual artists community. Each year we plan a program that engages local artists to deliver visual arts experiences that provide entry into different corners of the visual arts world and invite the entire community to learn, enjoy and delight in our local artists.

SALA Festival is deliberately inclusive in nature. We aim to nurture artists at all stages of their careers and to encourage broad community participation in creative life. We seek to inspire more people to make, communicate, and connect through visual art, as these are essential parts of being human and living well.

As a festival, we strive to celebrate and connect, growing networks, illuminating pathways for artists, and creating opportunities for collaboration across South Australia.

South Australia has a genius for creativity and a great capacity to celebrate and capitalise on this.

We thank all of SALA's supporters as we close the door on a wonderfully successful 2025 Festival and look to an exciting SALA Festival 2026.

SALA

History

SALA Festival celebrated its 28th anniversary in 2025. Founded in 1998 as SALA Week, it was established to educate local and inter/national audiences about the unique culture of leading visual artists living and working in South Australia, to promote the individuals and create opportunities for professional artists. In its first year there were 21 metropolitan venues and 20 country venues. Since then, it has become a monthlong celebration of South Australian art throughout the state, with over 700 exhibitions and 11,000 artists.






Who attends SALA?


Age profile

Recognising high quality work

SALA Feature Artist

Each year Arts South Australia funds the SA Living Artist Publication. The publication focuses on the production of a major, high-quality book profiling a prominent South Australian visual artist.

The artist selected for the publication becomes SALA's Feature Artist. Their work is profiled in the marketing material for the Festival as we celebrate their work and practice with the wider community. The book is developed and published by Wakefield Press.

Sue Kneebone was the subject of the 2025 SA Living Artist publication. Sue Kneebone is an interdisciplinary visual artist with an exhibition practice spanning more than twenty years. Her creative practice encompasses the processes of assemblage and montage to evoke new associations and contexts about memory, history and place.

Informed by in-depth research, Sue's art works seek to to stir up the spectre of what has been overlooked or suppressed in Australian historical memory. Sue has been known to describe her haunting aesthetic as a kind of 'Feral Aussie Gothic'.





SALA 2025 offered bus tours, visiting both galleries and artists' studio. Attendees had the unique opportunity to engage with artists, gain insights into their creative processes and explore their studios.

For the second year, the Adelaide Hills to Karoonda Lights Bus Tour tracked through Bridgewater and Murray Bridge. The bus stopped for lunch at Ondeen restaurant in the Adelaide Hills, then at the Hahndorf Academy to view its three exhibitions and for an artist talk and demonstration, before heading to Karoonda via Murray Bridget Art Gallery and the silos projection.

This tour was led by artist OAKEY and was supported by the District Council of Karoonda East Murray and Mount Barker District Council.

New to the program this year, the Barossa & Light bus tour, supported by Barossa Council and Light Regional Council, took 42 passengers on an exploration of the art and hospitality of the Barossa and Light regions. With artist talks at every stop, the tour visited Lyndoch Lavender farm, Barossa Regional Art Gallery, Tutti Arts Barossa, Hive in Angaston for lunch, JamFactory at Seppeltsfield, and Wonderground, before finishing with platters at Ministry of Beer in Lyndoch.

This tour was led by artist Anastasia Benveniste and was supported by the Barossa Council and Light Regional Council.

SALA in Schools

Every year South Australian schools and early learning centres register exhibitions of student artwork to be part of the Festival in August. This provides young people with real exhibition experience and places them in the same program as some of the state's most established artists. It also provides the wider South Australian community with a glimpse at our future artists.

SALA Festival is proud to have I-Nex as our Education Partner, supporting the visual arts in schools and school participation in the festival.

- A total of 56 exhibitions were registered by schools for the 2025 SALA Festival program, highlighting strong interest and participation.
- The program saw engagement from 5,000+ students, school staff members and community members in the exhibitions.
- We saw school exhibitions spanned 20 council areas across South Australia.

Foodland Tote Bags


