# SALA

SALA Festival is the largest open access visual arts festival in the Asia Pacific region and quite arguably, the world. South Australia offers a unique quality of life, which has resulted in the state being home to an exceptional community of artists. Artists thrive in South Australia. SALA Festival was founded 26 years ago to celebrate this quiet truth and to draw attention to the exceptional artists who live and create in the state of South Australia, and its unique visual arts ecology.

SALA Festival is deliberately inclusive in nature. We aim to nurture artists at all stages of their career and to encourage the timid and unsure out of their small, private spaces to engage and be part of the broader community of practicing visual artists. We want to encourage more people to create, to communicate and to connect through visual arts. We want to support more South Australian artists, because we know that to create is simply part of being human and living well.

As an open access festival, SALA understands the importance of cultivating not only artists but audiences. Audiences are integral to the visual artists community. To create within a community is to share, build, question, support and grow. Each year we plan a program that engages local artists to deliver visual arts experiences including art tours that provide insight into different corners of visual arts and practices, a range of workshops and masterclasses that provide entry into the skills and approaches used by artists and extension for those with current visual arts practices and cabaret-style events that invite the entire community to learn, enjoy and delight in our local artists.

We do this to create points of connection between artists and audiences and to deliver employment opportunities for our artists. This year, we have pushed forward with our support of economic outcomes for artists by launching the final stage of Shop SALA, our online sales platform connecting South Australian artists to audiences and buyers year-round. We will enjoy watching this line of revenue flow through and to support and develop our community of creatives.

This year over 10,895 artists created and exhibited work for 697 exhibitions across the entire state of SA the 2023 South Australian Living Artists (SALA) Festival and audiences exceeded 1,100,000.

South Australia's appetite for arts and culture is growing.

We thank all of our supporters as we close the door on a wonderfully successful 2023 Festival and look in earnest to SALA Festival 2024.

# History

SALA Festival celebrated its 26th anniversary in 2023. Founded by Paul Greenaway OAM and Sam Hill-Smith through the Australian Commercial Galleries Association (ACGA), it started as SALA Week in 1998. It was established to educate local, Australian and international audiences about the unique culture of leading visual artists living and working in South Australia, and create opportunities for them. In its first year there were 21 metropolitan venues and 20 country venues. Since then, it has become a month-long celebration of local art throughout the state, with over 650 exhibitions and 10000 artists.

#### Purpose

SALA is a state-wide showcase and celebration of South Australia's living visual artists.

It culminates in Australia's largest and most inclusive visual arts festival, which takes place in galleries and nontraditional arts spaces across South Australia annually, during the entire month of August.

Each year, SALA takes the work of around 10,000 emerging, mid-career and established South Australian artists to more than 600 venues across the state (from sheds, cafés, offices and retail spaces to wineries, schools, public spaces, galleries, and major arts institutions) to reach local and inter/national audiences of more than 1,100,000 people, and many more online.

#### Vision

To champion South Australia's living visual artists and draw inter/national attention to the unique and exceptional ecology of visual art in South Australia.

To support South Australian visual artists working at any stage of career and in any medium are able to make, share and receive recognition for their work.

To enrich and inspire South Australian communities and audiences by their engagement with South Australian visual art, including the large number of 'incidental' arts audiences for whom SALA's local exhibitions is their first point of engagement with the arts.

To embed SALA Festival as a vibrant and valued part of all South Australian communities, and inter/nationally recognised as a diverse, democratic and inclusive visual arts champion that enhances our own and the world's understanding of this unique place and our pride in the art it creates.








#### Gender profile

# **Recognising high quality work**

#### **SALA Feature Artist**

Each year Arts South Australia funds the SA Living Artist Publication. The publication focuses on the production of a major, high-quality book profiling a prominent South Australian visual artist.

The selected artist for the publication becomes SALA's featured artist. Their work is profiled in the marketing material for the Festival and we are able to celebrate their work and practice with the wider community. The book is developed and published by Wakefield Press.

Helen Fuller was the subject of the 2023 SA Living Artist publication. Helen is a multi-disciplinary South Australian artist whose practice includes painting, ceramics, sculpture, photography and installation. A prolific artist and cherished member of the South Australian artistic community, her career began in 1978 where she studied fine art at the Torrens College of Advanced Education (now the University of South Australia). In 1994 Fuller completed a Master of Visual Arts at the University of South Australia. In 2009 she began pottery classes, making her first pinch pots. Since that time, she has produced a large body of hand-built terracotta

forms. Her painterly approach to surface decoration draws on her painting practice.

During the 2023 SALA Festival, Fuller's work could be seen at the Art Gallery of South Australia, where a series of newly acquired works were on display. She also held an exhibition, 'Shedding', at Adelaide Central Gallery following the SALA Festival.

A total of 25 books have been published since 2000, profiling artists Helen Fuller, Mark Valenzuela, Roy Ananda, Kirsten Coelho, Louise Haselton, Clare Belfrage, Christopher Orchard, Catherine Truman, Giles Bettison, Nicholas Folland, Stephen Bowers, Mark Kimber, Hossein Valamanesh, Khai Liew, Angela Valamanesh, Gerry Wedd, Julie Blyfield, Aldo Iacobelli, Michelle Nikou, Deborah Paauwe, Ian W. 


# **Regional Self-Guided Art Tours**

# SALA In Schools

Every year South Australian schools and early learning centres register exhibitions of student artwork to be part of the Festival in August. This provides young people with real exhibition experience and places them in the same program as some of the state's most established artists. It also provides the wider South Australian community a glimpse at our future artists.

SALA Festival is happy to have worked with Credit Union SA to support the visual arts in schools and school participation in the festival.

- A total of 55 exhibitions were registered by schools for the 2023 SALA Festival program, highlighting strong interest and participation.
- The program saw engagement from 5,200+ students, school staff members and community members in the exhibitions.
- 2023 SALA school exhibitions spanned 20 council areas across South Australia.

#### **Create4Adelaide**

This year, SALA Festival partnered with Adelaide Festival to introduce Create4Adelaide, a project aimed at empowering young artists and thinkers.

Create4Adelaide spans an entire year and provides a unique platform for individuals, groups, and entire classes to channel their creativity and contribute to the conversation about climate change and its impact on communities. Individuals, groups and whole classes were asked to submit entries and the top-voted projects were linked with an artist to undertake workshops to further develop the work.

**Artists:** Laura Wills and Will Cheesman, Oakey, Emmaline Zanelli, and Rebecca McEwan led workshops in schools across South Australia.

Create4Adelaide will culminate in an exhibition of young people's work presented in the 2024 Adelaide Festival.

### SALA Curated Exhibitions

In 2023 SALA curated the 10th consecutive SALA in the Park exhibition as part of our highly valued partnership with Centennial Park.

The beautiful cemetery and memorial park welcomed the work of South Australian sculptural artists into the landscape new context to works of Peter DeMaria, James Hamilton, Daniel Toonen, Matt Turley, and Lorry Wedding-Marchioro.

#### **SALA Podcast**


